

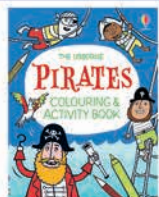
# Treasure map

These instructions give two routes to buried treasure. Captain Rio took the first. Captain Lobsouse took the second. Who reached the treasure first?

*From the pointed pair on the island of mud, head west to the isle of fiery rock. Sail south to the place where the dolphins dive then travel eastward until a monster blocks thy path. Steer to the south then drop anchor and trek to the mountains of mist and shadow. Wend thy way between the three and the one then seek the swirling plain of shifting sands. Head southwest and dig under the lonely pine tree for thy prize.*

*Set sail south of the twin palms on the isle of mud. Steer southwesterly past the diving dolphins and through the narrow pass. Follow the coast but be sure to sail between the pointed peaks or scuttled will ye surely be. Skirt around the Pointing Peninsula, turn northeast and drop anchor in the bay. Head east and delve deep at the foot of the lonesome pine tree for thy reward.*
