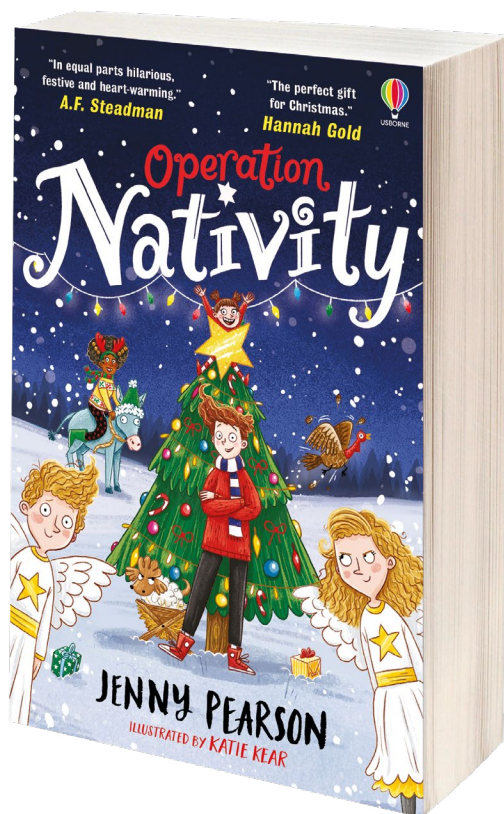

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WEEK ONE: OPERATION SAVE CHRISTMAS BEGINS

Reading: Pages 5-84

Discussion Questions:

- Oscar says, “people will always believe different things and I actually think that’s okay.” (p. 8) Can you think of anything your friends believe that you don’t? Do you agree with Oscar?
- What does Oscar think is the most important thing about Christmas? Discuss what you think are the most important things.
- There are a lot of fun characters in the story. Who is your favourite and why? Can you think of fun traits or traditions that your family have?
- When Oscar first finds Angel Gabriel, he struggles to believe he’s an angel because, “once you’ve made up your mind that something isn’t real, it’s easy to dismiss the evidence” (p. 59). How do you think you would react if you found an angel in your garden?
- How does Molly help Oscar realise the truth about the angel? Discuss how people’s different perspectives can help us see things differently.

Activity: Decorate for Christmas

It’s time to start decorating for Christmas! Dig out your decorations and start making your room/house feel festive. Use the snowflake activity to create your own magical decorations.

Activity: To me, Christmas means...

Think about what you love about Christmas. Make a list of all the things that are important to you during the festive season.



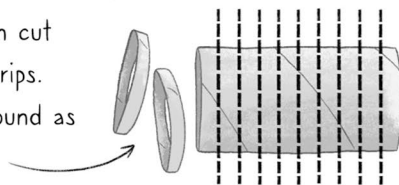
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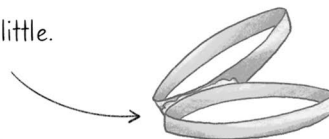
Snowflake Decoration

Oscar's family make paper snowflakes to decorate the church for their nativity performance. Try making your own – you'll need a long cardboard tube, glue and thread.

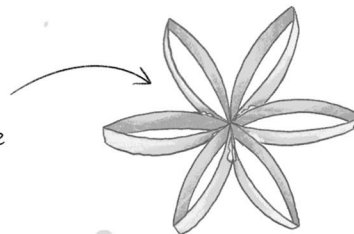
1. Press the tube flat then cut off twelve loop-shaped strips. Each one needs to be around as wide as your finger.



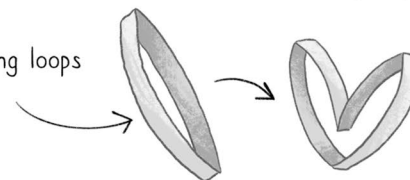
2. Open out six of the loops a little. Glue two together, like this.



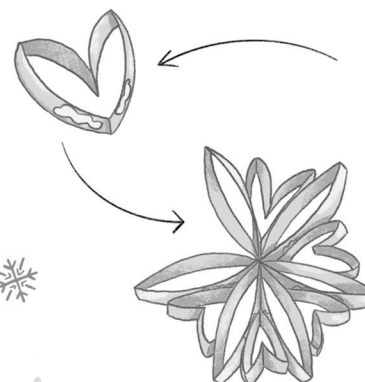
3. Glue on four more, so it looks like a snowflake. Let the glue dry.



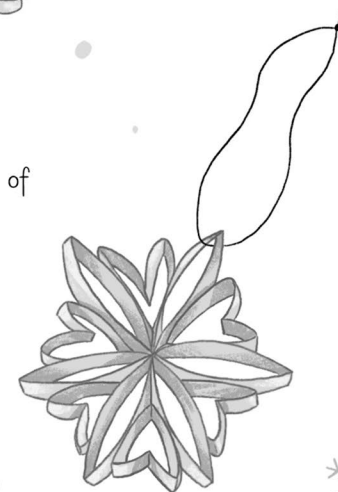
4. Fold all the remaining loops in half, like this.



5. Glue both sides of each folded shape onto the snowflake. Let it dry.



6. Tie thread through one of the loops to hang it up.

WEEK TWO: A GIFT FIT FOR THE SAVIOUR OF THE WORLD

Reading: Pages 85-169

Discussion Questions:

- Oscar doesn't tell any of the adults about Angel Gabriel as he says, "Grown-ups are very short-sighted about that sort of thing." (p. 89) What do you think he means here?
- Why do you think the nativity play is so important to Grandmother?
- Oscar is starting to get a bit panicked about saving Christmas in time. If you were in his position, what would your plan be?
- Fenella tries to act as if she isn't upset about Grandfather being ill – what other things do people do to disguise their emotions?
- How is Oscar's attitude towards Christmas changing as the story goes on?

Activity: My Christmas Wish List

Use the following activity sheet to fill out your wish list. It doesn't just need to include physical presents. Are you wishing for snow this Christmas? Or perhaps you're wishing for a fun day with your family. Draw some of the items on your list too.

Activity: My Christmas Joke

Can you come up with your best Christmas jokes? Will they make us laugh? We'll start with one...

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WEEK THREE: ALL SYSTEMS GO!

Reading: pages 170-254

Discussion Questions:

- Does Balthazar give Gabriel good advice? (p. 172-173)
- Oscar's mum says that making the biscuits together made them taste better. Do you think she's right? Can you think of activities that are better when done with friends and family?
- Balthazar and Gabriel do not fit in in Chipping Bottom. What things do they do that would stand out? How do they add to the humour of the book?
- Grandfather helps to reassure Oscar when he says, "I can tell you are the type of person who can achieve anything if they put their mind to it." (p. 206) How does this help Oscar?
- Oscar says Christmas is all about "being together and celebrating a magical time of the year when us kids can believe in the impossible." How has this changed from the beginning of the book? Has your opinion on Christmas changed too?

Activity: Christmas Crafting

Start thinking about presents you could make for your friends and family this year. Start by decorating Christmas cards! Cut out the card template and decorate them using pens, paint, tissue paper or anything else you have.

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WEEK FOUR: THE CHRISTMAS WE SAVED CHRISTMAS

Reading: pages 255-341

Discussion Questions:

- When Oscar thinks about life being good, he thinks about his family practising for the nativity together (p. 297). Discuss memories you have that make you believe life is good.
- Gabriel says that sadness and joy cannot exist without each other (p. 298). Do you agree with this?
- Oscar asks Gabriel for a favour (p. 299). How does this scene make you feel?
- Grandfather tells his grandchildren that each of them will “carry a little part of me inside. No one is ever truly gone, when there are people around to remember them” (p. 328). Do you agree with this?
- The story ends with a mixture of joy and sadness. Discuss how the book made you feel.

Activity: Christmas Poem

Write a poem exploring the joy of Christmas. Your poem could be titled either ‘Christmas is...’ or ‘Christmas makes me...’. Explore how the book makes you feel about Christmas.

Activity: Operation Nativity is complete!
